


COMMON TYPES OF Plagiarism



COPY & PASTE

Copying multiple sources word-for-word and pasting these together without incorporating original thought.




FIND & REPLACE

Changing a few words and phrases from an original source and passing that work off as your own.



AI-GENERATED

Using content (text, research, images, entire essays, etc.) generated by artificial intelligence in your work without disclosing its use.




GHOST CITATION (FABRICATION)

Citing a source that doesn't exist or making up information from a source.



IMPROPER CITING

Failing to include in-text citations or an accurate reference list, not citing secondary sources properly, or not giving credit to the correct author.



PURCHASING

Purchasing sections or entire essays and submitting them as your own work.



REMIX

Paraphrasing multiple citations from sources and stitching them together to present them as your own words.




SELF-PLAGIARISM (RECYCLING)

Reusing work from previous courses without getting permission from your current instructor first.



SHARING WORK (COLLUSION)

Sharing your work with other students that they submit as their own, or others sharing their work with you that you submit as your own.
